

She has been a public school teacher, and since 1982 has traveled throughout the US and other countries leading workshops and giving lectures on the art of quilting.

Ami has made over 200 quilts of varying sizes & genres, both hand and machine quilting. She has authored 9 books on quilting, appeared in many tv shows and was the creator of the very successful Alzheimer's Art Quilt Initiative as well as the Worst quilt in the World Contest. She was named the 2005 Teacher of the Year by Professional Quilter Magazine. She lives in Flint, Michigan with her husband Steve & Scooter the Wonder Dog. She has a grown daughter and granddaughter Zoey.



2016 OLD TOWN QUILT SHOW NEWS

A big thank you to all who have volunteered to serve on the quilt show committee! We greatly appreciate your help. And hey, if you didn't volunteer yet but are thinking you might, we welcome your participation at any time!

As the committee begins the work of sorting out and arranging the details of this fall's show, all Guild members can help us in other ways as well.

- 1) Plan to hang your quilts in the show. As we have mentioned before, every quilt you have made is worthy of hanging in this show. When Marci Schaffer finally gets a chance to show us the DVD of last year's quilt show, you'll see why. Even the quilt you made when you first started quilting will fit in. Really! Each quilt that hangs as a small part of the whole show is sort of like a single fabric in a scrap quilt. All the fabrics blend into a lovely, scrappy whole.
- 2) Plan to make quilts for the large quilt live auction and items for the silent auction. Although the Silent Auction was recently expanded (goods-wise) to include table runners in addition to the mini quilts, it now includes even more! This year you can also donate aprons and totes/bags! So now there are many more options for donations to the silent auction.

Don't forget you can receive up to 50% of the sale price of quilts sold in the live auction, and this can really add up! *You* set the minimum price (if you wish). We are happy to give you advice based on how quilts have sold in the past; just ask us. Our auctioneer is very, very good, and he really increased bid totals on quilts sold last year. We are optimistic for 2016 sales figures!

Friendship groups, feel free to start work on a cooperative group quilt for the live auction. Several groups do this each year, and there's always a friendly rivalry over whose quilts get the highest bids!

The next quilt show committee meeting will be Friday, April 8, at 1:00 pm at the Grace Mellman Public Library in Temecula. Hope to see you there! --Ellen French, Quilt Show Assistant


Aka/ Brown Bag

Quilter of the Month: Edith Nicholson



We see Edith every month at the front door giving us tickets for door prizes. Her friendly smile and warm heart welcome us. But who is she?

Edith began her journey on earth in Canada. Her mother was a professional seamstress, She had come from Romania and had studied needlework skills there. She got Edith started with embroidery. Later in school, Edith found Home Economics and loved it. She made many of her own clothes. Sewing became a favored hobby. She got into home dec because her mother in law loved pillows, drapes and other sewn items in her home. You can see one of the pillows below.

Edith was blessed to have a sister and two brothers. Her sister turned out to be pivotal for her. Her sister married a hockey player who was traded to California. Block of the Month

Block of The Month 2016: Block #4 Drawing at May general meeting

We are still using our black, white, grey, and one color of your choice palette. We encourage you to make two blocks, one to enter in the drawing and one to keep. This block is especially easy to make two of, because the main fabric is a big square that is cut in half diagonally – and each block only needs one half, Be accurate on your seams and sew a scant quarter inch. The block is called Amish Roman Stripes by Milinda Stephenson.



Cutting Instructions (for one block):

From the White: One 12" square; recut in half diagonally, you only need one half when making one block

From the Black: Cut one 3" x 19" strip; recut into:

¥ one 3" X 14.5" strip ¥ one 3" x 4.5" strip

From the Gray: Cut one 3" x 9.5" strip

From the Green (your color): Cut one 3" x 18" strip

General Instructions:

Place the 3" x 18" green (your color) strip right sides together along the long edge of the 12" white half square triangle. The strip should extend past the corner of the triangle on both sides evenly.

Stitch using a scant 1/4" seam allowance. Press the seam toward the color strip.


Center the 14.5" black strip right sides together along the long edges with the color strip. Stitch and press the seam toward the black strip.

Repeat to stitch the grey and remaining black strips in place.

When complete, trim to 12 1/2" x 12 1/2". When trimming, look at the placement of you square up ruler to see if it looks like the photo above. You don't want to trim off too much of the black strip in the lower right hand corner.

Happy sewing!

How to Make 3 Fabric Pillowcases

By Marlene Oaks Valley of the Mist Quilters Guild

Body: 27" width of fabric

Cuff: 10" width of fabric

Accent strip: 2 1/2" width of fabric

Use contrasting fabrics for interesting results.



- 1. Fold and press the accent fabric in half, along its length, wrong sides together.
- 2. Place cuff fabric right side **up**. Put the folded accent strip along the top side, matching the raw edges.
- Align the body fabric on top of the pile, right side down, matching its raw edge with the other raw edges.
- 4. Lightly pin.
- 5. With raw edges still at the top, roll the fabric from the bottom until the roll is above the bottom edge of the face-up cuff fabric.
- 6. Bring the cuff fabric up and over the roll, creating a tube. Match the cuff's raw edge to the other raw edges and re-pin.
- 7. Sew the tube together, using a ¼" seam.
- Reverse the tube, pulling the case outside. Press the seam and trim the sides to remove selvages.
- 9. Fold fabrics **wrong** sides together, and sew along the side and bottom with an 1/8" to a ¼' seam in an L shape. Turn the case inside out and press the seams.
- 10. Sew the side and bottom seams again with a 3/8" or ½" L shaped seam. Turn right sides ou page 11 and re-press the French seams.

HELP VETERANS

GET INVOLVED TO HELP VETERANS!

U.S. Vets is a nonprofit organization dedicated to ending and preventing homelessness for veterans. Toward that end, U.S. Vets has, in conjunction with housing developer Cantewell-Anderson—now called Cloudbreak Development—opened housing sites specifically for veterans throughout the country. Each site incorporates a Veterans In Progress (VIP) work re-entry program. In addition, most sites also offer special needs programs that include employment services, case management, substance abuse programs, mental health services, and permanent and long-term transitional housing.

Riverside County has one of the highest populations of homeless veterans in the United States. That's our back yard. The U.S. Vets' Inland Empire operation is located at the March Air Reserve Base in Moreno Valley, proving housing and support services to 130 veterans each day. They are currently housed in one of the existing barracks which has been brought up to code. On November 9, 2015, U.S. Vets held a groundbreaking ceremony for March Veterans Village. According to the U.S. Vets website, the March Veterans Village "is a labor of love between U.S. Vets, Coachella Valley Housing Coalition and the March Joint Powers Authority, which will usher in decent, safe, permanent affordable housing for previously homeless veterans and their families." Once completed, the effort will almost double the organization's ability to provide permanent supportive housing to veterans in the Inland Empire.

During the course of 2015, guild members Lynn Korito and Sherry Riddle initiated an effort to collect toiletries and clothing for these formerly homeless veterans. When Lynn realized that the toiletries, etc. would be given to the vets at their Christmas dinner and party—in trash bags—she realized that the guild should be making pillowcases to hold the gifts instead. This we did. Many guild members responded generously, donating goods and making pillowcases. Lynn and Sherry invited me to come along with them and local D.A.R. members to the U.S. Vets Christmas dinner in December so I could meet some vets and see the end result of what we were doing.

I am so glad I went. We shared a delicious dinner and shook hands with as many vets as possible, thanking them for their service, and wishing them well. After dinner we sang Christmas carols and then distributed the pillowcases full of toiletries, socks and T Shirts. At the end, they all stood up and thanked us. *They* sincerely thanked us for a paltry gift of soap, shampoo and socks, when everyone in this country should have been thanking *them* for their selfless gift of service for our freedom, service which frequently results in an almost inevitable slow slide toward homelessness. We owe all these service men and women a debt that overwhelms me.

How can you help? Please consider bringing regular donations to guild meetings: toiletries (full-size or travel/motel size), to include soap, toothbrushes, toothpaste, shampoo. Clothing of all kinds, clean and in good condition. Socks, underwear, jeans, slacks, shirts, even dressier items to include neckties, as these guys need to go on occasional job interviews. Underwear and socks should be new, but outerwear need not be. Next time you're in Big Lots or Target or Walmart, grab a pack of socks or underwear, and bring it to guild. Next time you're in Costco, grab a pack of toothbrushes or toothpaste or soap.

And please, make some pillowcases! Make them manly—no kiddie or feminine prints, please. There should be pillowcase-making instructions in this issue of the newsletter, and we will have some at the guild meeting as well. Maybe we can have a demo at the July meeting of Quilt University. If we exceed the number we need, we'll hold on to them until the next year. My own personal mission has become making as many twin-size quilts as I possibly can this year for the vets. I don't think I can make 100 in a year, as I only have four made so far, but I'm working on it! Feel free to join me, and don't forget to bring your donations to guild. Lynn always has a big cart with her to collect our donations.

Valley of the Mist Quilters Guild 2014 Challenge Quilt Rules

Our Hispanic Heritage



Heritage" is defined as the customs and traditions that are handed down from generation to generation of families and society. Hispanic culture is prevalent throughout beautiful California from the Spanish architecture we see all around us to the names of many of our cities and streets. Jane Tenorio-Coscarelli will be our featured quilter at the 2016 quilt show. She is known for her colorful quilts depicting Hispanic themes, plus National Hispanic Heritage month runs from September 15th to October 15th...right in line with September meeting and our quilt show. We will be celebrating by making this the theme for our 2016 Valley of the Mist Challenge Quilts.

Rules

- 🌟 Entry must be a new quilt created especially for this challenge.
- The quilt theme must be a clear representation of some aspect of Hispanic heritage. For example, architecture, food, traditions, holidays, color, etc.
- Quilt may be pieced, appliqued, or drawn. Art mediums may be used such as fabric paints, watercolor pencils or crayons or ink.
- 🌞 Quilt may be an original design or made using a published pattern.
- Name your quilt and pin a 3x5 card to the front telling us more about it. Your name may not be on this card and the label on the back will be covered.
- Quilt must be labeled on the back with the name of the quilt, indicating whether design is original or pattern. Should a published pattern be used, note the name of the pattern and the designer. Include your name and date of completion.
- Finished quilts will be displayed at the September 13th meeting where members will vote. There will be three ribbons awarded: best interpretation of theme, best use of color, and most innovative. Winners will be announced at September meeting and will be on display at the quilt show in Old Town
- ** Challenge chairperson will hold all of the quilts for display at the quilt show in Old Town on October 1st. Quilts will be available for pickup on quilt show day at 4:00 pm or at the November 9th guild meeting.

THE MAKING OF OUR QUILT

Oroville Piecemakers Quilt Guild members began this quilt in 2008. We chose this pattern because it allowed Guild members, with different skills, to participate. Many members contributed fabrics, buttons and other embellishments. Some foundation pieced the crazy patch corners. Others appliqued the centers of each month's block. Next, more members did the embroidery on the corners and centers. Others worked on the ribbon embroidery, laces and buttons. Once the quilt was assembled into two block units and machine quilted around the edges, still other members hand quilted each of the blocks. Finally, the blocks were sown together using the "Lap Quilting" method. More then 35 members participated in making this quilt some are no longer with us.
