

Opportunity Quilt 2016

Triangle Ranch, our new opportunity quilt for 2016, will be at the Road 2 California quilt show in Ontario on Friday, January 22, 2016. In order for our guild to be allowed to sell opportunity quilt tickets we must provide 20 hours of white glove volunteers. White glove volunteers must work a two hour shift on any of the 4 days of the show from Thursday, January 21st to Sunday, January 24th. We are asked to not sign up more than 3 people in one 2 hour slot. If too many people sign up for one time period, the show organizers will ask you to change your shift.

The show staff provides each volunteer with the white gloves and an apron to identify you. They select an area of the show for you to work. You get to touch the quilts and show the back of quilts to visitors. The best part is that you get a wrist band for free entry to the show for all four days if you agree to work for two hours.

Please contact me to sign up. I will have the lists at the November meeting on the 10th. There is a limited time to sign up. If we do not get enough volunteers we will not be allowed to have our quilt at the show. I need to send in the list of volunteers by the end of November.

See me at the meeting to pick up your packet of opportunity quilt tickets if you haven't received them already. Be sure to sign up to white glove at Road. If you won't be able to come to the next meeting, do call me with your preference of day and time to work as a white glove volunteer.



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Celebrating Quilter of the Month



Quilter of the Month Savanah Wallace



Savanah was born in Mississippi and went through elementary school and high school there during the time of segregation. She went to middle school in Michigan where her opportunities were expanded, for example, she learned to swim in Michigan. She was offered a college scholarship at a Presbyterian College in Alabama to learn mortuary science, but she decided to give the scholarship back as she did not want to become a mortician. Instead she got married and had two children. After the children were in school, Savanah went to nursing school. Her first marriage ended, and she packed up the children and came to California.

She worked at Scripps Hospital as hospital supervisor of the night shift. She fell in love, but he was in the military and was called to Virginia. Their engagement became official over the telephone! They moved to North Carolina and then Hawaii. Savanah loved Hawaii and made friends with women who were into crafts. She learned to paint on fabric and made a tablecloth. She made her family tree for her parents' anniversary and turned it into what she described as an awful quilt. Later she made a better one for her sister. While in Hawaii, she got her B.A. at Hawaii Loa College.

Savanah's mother taught her to sew, and she made plus size garments for women, including some of her high school teachers. So she learned to tailor from her mother and from experimenting herself. She used to sit under the quilt at sewing bees and push the needle back up. When she finally got to a home economics class she already knew how to sew.

In 1989 they moved back to California to the San Diego area. Her husband retired in 1990 and her mother came to live with them. They looked for a home with wheelchair access and found their current home here in 1994. They took care of her mom for 10 years. She was so busy with her mom that she didn't even know the neighbors. A friend encouraged her to get out and requested a quilt. Savannah took a basic class and made her first log cabin quilt. She found a long arm quilter in Riverside to quilt it. In 2003 there was a notice in the newspaper about our guild and she went. Right away she met Tina Sandoval and Dene Ryan and several others and was suddenly in a wonderful friendship group.

Savanah loves it that our guild has members with all kinds of skill sets and everyone shares and helps each other. Women come together in a way that reminds her of sitting under the quilt at bees when she was a girl. Her friendship group made 14 quilts for Katrina which were sent to her brother to give out. She is also part of our philanthropy here. She hangs quilts at our quilt show and stays all day. Her favorite quilts to make are pieced quilts. She loves to pitch in, and we are glad she does. It is a wonderful guild.

US Vets Update



I wanted to bring the most current information to the guild, so I placed a call to a manager who oversees the supply room. He explained to me that besides the homeless veterans at March Air Reserve Base, they also have several properties (off-site) where the men can go live, after they have found employment, but still need some assistance. In addition, US Vets help the Veterans set-up their own homes. All the donations funnel through the donation center at March Air Force Base and could go to several other locations. Keeping that in mind, the manager stated they really could use any household items. Here are some items which are needed at this time. (They always need toiletries, cleaning supplies and personal items.)

- *Twin sheet sets
- *Pillows & cases
- *Towel sets (bath, hand & face)
- *Bathmats
- *Dress shirts & pants (for job interviews)
- *Twin size blankets

Block of the Month


Block of the Month: Block 11--blocks due at the January meeting (no drawing in December)

Only one more to go after this and we'll have been at it for a full year! Time does fly! We are still using our neutal color palette. The colors shown in the these instructions are for illustration only. There is a picture below on the right and additional information about the palette is in the January 2015 newsletter. All blocks are 12.5" blocks — 12" finished

So getting down the business of this block... It's a relatively simple one but involves triangles which means cutting some of the fabric on the bias (across the grain) so take care to not tug on edges of the triangles as you're working with them. It's very easy to stretch and warp the fabric when it's cut on the bias, so be mindful of that.

This block is simple, but leads to really great, graphic quilt layouts.





Fabric Requirements: (If making two blocks -double this.)

Fabric A (main triangle): 12" square Fabric C (print): 6" x 3.5" scrap Fabric B (background): 6.5" wide WOF (width of fabric) strip Fabric D (print): 6" x 3.5" scrap

Cut List + Instructions: :

A1 = Triangle from 12" square, see directions below.

B1 = 6.5" x 16"

B2 = 6.5" x 16"


 $C1 = 6" \times 3.5"$

D1 = 6" x 3.5"

To cut out A1:


- 1. Fold the 12" x 12" square in half.
- Cutting from one corner to the other along the line as indicated on the diagram and trim the square into a triangle (A1).

Tip: If you're making a lot of these blocks, you can cut out one triangle this way. Then, you can use it as a template to cut out many more triangles out of a 12" WOF strip. This will help you avoid a lot of wasted fabric.




Assembling the Block:

1. Sew B1 to one edge of A1. When you line up the ends of B1 center the extra length on either end. Be sure to press after this step. I prefer to press my seams open, but it's up to you.






2. Sew B2 onto the other long edge of A1, again being sure to center the extra length of B2.




3. Using a 12.5" ruler (Don't have one yet? You can use a normal ruler, just be sure to not cut too much off of one side of the piecing) square up the block. Use the bottom edge of A1 as a guide and keep A1 centered in the block.



- 4. With right sides of fabric together (so the wrong side of C1 will show) line up C1 with the upper left corner of your squared up piecing, making sure that you've lined the edges up so that they meet 3.75" in and down from the corner.
- Sew on C1.
- 6. Repeat this process for with D1 on the upper right corner.
- 7. Trim off the extra B background fabric, and press C1 and D1 up.





8. Now trim C1 and D1 to square up the 12.5" block and you're all finished!

PHILANTHROPY CHAIR: One of the main objectives of our Guild is to have an active Philanthropy Group. We have LOTS of fabric in storage, and a willing group of members who make and/or finish the philanthropy quilts. The Chair will organize, help and direct the members in this endeavor.

MERCHANDISE TABLE: This is a monthly & important fundraiser for the Guild. This person, or persons will organize items of interest & sell tickets to members during the meetings. They will announce winners & get deposit to the Treasurer. The items are donated and/or purchased with Guild funds. This requires attending monthly meetings, with the exception of the summer months.

PARLIAMENTARIAN: This job mostly entails organizing the November election process. The Bylaws were just revised, so unless there is a point of order, this will be the main duty for the year.

SCCQG REPRESENTATIVE: This person (or persons) attends & represents our Guild at 4 quarterly meetings by the Southern Calif. Council of Quilt Guilds. A report is then given to the board about the meeting. The meetings are in the Southern California area and usually there are others who might be interested in going with you to a meeting.

AUDITOR: This person will audit the Treasurer's financial records during the year and report findings to the President and the Board. There is a procedure manual and it does not require an accounting background.


