Veterans Update



Ladies, thank you for your consistent generosity to our vets. With your help, their Christmas gifts will be fuller this year. If you want to make a quilt for a vet, it must be big enough to fit a twin-size bed, so at least 64" wide and at least 80" long. Wider and longer is ok. We did notice that many of the guys were drawn to colorful, and not necessarily to red/white/blue. (While they are quite proud of their military service and probably have great love for their country, their service is also what

caused such distress that they ended up on the streets.) Please note that these quilts and program are not Quilts of Valor. Quilts of Valor very often make quilts smaller than bed size, and it is also a different program altogether. Our intent here is to make a bed quilt that these guys can sleep under nightly, and as a result, maybe feel wrapped in love and caring. That is the sole reason why we make them. So put your heart and soul unto making them, and please add a label to the back, with your name and the year on it, and maybe your best wishes. We usually write something like "love to you" or "Sleep well." "Best wishes" would also be appropriate.

Pillowcases are also needed, as a "gift bag" that is also a handmade pillowcase. Let us know at our table if you need a pillowcase pattern. We will also be doing a pillowcase construction demo at our July "Quilt University" program. You may turn in pillowcases for vets to us at our table that you have made from your stash. **If you made pillowcases from a Philanthropy kit, please return those completed pillowcases to the Philanthropy gals.**

Please plan to display your quilts in the show! Please note that you do NOT have to be an experienced quilter to participate. You just have to be a guild member! We would be delighted if every single member committed to show her quilts this fall. Rest assured, any mistakes will vanish into the big, colorful spectacle that is the Quilt Show.

As for your auction quilts, usually the larger the quilt, the higher the bidding usually goes!


2017 Challenge Quilt



The Quilt:

- Your challenge is to create a **house block quilt.** It can be anything from wall hanging to a full size quilt. House blocks or houses must be the main feature so that when viewed it can be clearly defined as a house block quilt.
- It must be a quilt...that is, it must contain a front and back with batting in between and be quilted either by machine or by hand.

House blocks... a minimum of 5 houses in the quilt. No maximum.



- Any size block is acceptable
- Any method is acceptable... appliqué, piecing, embroidery, etc.
- Any fabric choice is acceptable but you must use fabric.
- The addition of other blocks of your choice is acceptable.
- Embellishments are acceptable.



Norma Enfield



It is such a pleasure to be able to share some of **Norma Enfield's amazing life of service and compassion.**

She told me immediately that she has 3 twin sisters – hmmm. Maybe you guessed it, she is a twin and her mom also had another set of twins. They were born in Michigan and mostly

raised there and in California. Norma sat and watched her mom sewing for some time, was fascinated by sewing, and finally her mom began to teach her. She was so advanced by the time she entered high school that her Home Ec teacher had her make shirts for her husband, while the other

students were making simple aprons! She was also given the assignment to make crushed velvet jackets that went on display.

Things were financially difficult at home. So, Norma made prom dresses out of polyester double knit. Can you imagine? She earned the money to purchase the fabric by

babysitting. Norma and her twin were great students and they graduated Salutatorian and Valedictorian. They both got married right out of high school. When Norma's son was a year old, they moved back to California.

Norma began to quilt in the early 80's. She joined the Orange County Quilt Guild and held several offices, including librarian. In 1995 they moved to Temecula Valley, and she joined Valley of the Mist right away.

In 2008 she found her love, her purpose and her mission, when she discovered **Quilts of Valor.** She loves to turn red, white and blue pieces of fabric into amazing quilts for our veterans and their families. Norma loves to do traditional piecing, and also likes paper piecing.

She has set up an incredible local Quilts of Valor organization.Since 2008 her group has made and given away 973 adult quilts and 1327 children's quilts to the children of military families in the Balboa Naval

Hospital. She has notebooks describing each quilt, a photo of the quilt and a photo of the recipient. She tries to have the person who made the quilt be at the ceremony to present the quilt.

Norma has a son and 2 grandchildren, and has been married for 35 years. Horses are a passion of hers, and she owns 2. She says that her horses make her smile and every day she goes 3 miles to the boarding

stable to be with her horses. Norma looks forward to her husband's retirement in 2019 when they will move to their home in Prescott, Arizona. There will be plenty of room for her horses on their 2 acres.

Norma says she likes the diversity of our guild and her favorite parts of each meeting are "Show and Tell", and also the speakers. She has done block of the month and the library here, but she is so busy with Quilts of Valor that there is no spare time anymore. Norma says that she is shy unless she is talking about Quilts of Valor. So be sure to talk with her and find out more about Norma and this incredible mission.


more successful by contributing a basket with their name and list of items contained in the basket for the Silent Auction table.

Block of the Month

Block of The Month 2017: Block #4

Block is due at the May meeting.

This month we are continuing our color scheme for the year: black, white, the monthly birthstone color, and a shade (or tint) of that color. This month's color is light yellow, so your second color should be either yellow or dark yellow. Please look at the January newsletter for the color chart.

This block is called a split 9 patch. We encourage you to make two blocks, one to enter in the drawing and one to keep. Please sew with a accurate quarter inch. We are using a basic short cut method for the half-square triangle sections. You will need to trim them to size to allow for slight inaccuracies with the various levels of sewers we have. Making an even number of blocks will be more efficient, since we need 3 half square triangle sections for each block.

Cut list -- For one block:

From both white and black fabrics:

- Two 5" squares
- One 4 1/2" square

From both yellow fabrics:

- Two 4 1/2" squares

For two blocks:

- Three 5" squares
- Two 4 1/2" square

- Four 4 1/2" squares


Assembling the block:

To make the half square triangle sections, draw a diagonal line on the back of white 5" squares. Place each white square right sides together with a black 5" square. Sew 1/4" from each side of the drawn line. Cut on the drawn line. Press to the black. Use a ruler to square up these sections to 4 1/2 " squares.

- Lay out pieces to match photo 2. Sew together in rows. Press each row in the opposite direction of the row above. This will allow you to butt the seams to get a good fit when sewing rows together.
- · Sew rows together.
- Press and using a 12 ½" square up ruler, trim to get a 12 ½" block. Repeat to make a second block!

This is great practice for half square triangles. Have fun!


