

For this workshop you can bring your lunch or buy at a fast food restaurant nearby. We will supply snacks and water.

We have one open position remaining for our executive board which is the Ways & Means Chair. The official job description for this position from our by-laws is as follows:

The WAYS AND MEANS CHAIR shall oversee, coordinate and develop fundraising activities including, but not limited to, the Old Town Temecula Quilt Show, Opportunity Quilt, June Basket Bonanza, Merchandise Table, and the Monthly Mini. The Ways and Means Chair shall also supervise and direct a committee to develop ideas and projects for fundraising.

In the past few years our Ways & Means Chair has not overseen the Quilt Show, but rather our Quilt Show Chair has. We are now trying to incorporate the full job description for the Ways & Means Chair and have them involved, as our by-laws state, with all fundraising including the Quilt Show. Our Quilt Show has grown too large for the Quilt Show Chair to handle it alone. Therefore, we are looking for a Ways & Means Chair that will be more closely aligned with our by-laws job description as noted above.

If you are interested, please let me or Ellen French know. The Quilt Show Chair will be still the primary person that organizes and runs the Quilt Show.

Other board positions that have been filled are listed on the following page. The red highlighted positions are still unfilled. If you would like to help, please let me know. Job descriptions are below for your review. More detailed descriptions and notebooks are available for each position. Thank you to everyone who has stepped up and helped out. We have an amazing guild and your help is greatly appreciated by all who enjoy the guild activities and events!

OPEN POSITIONS

The **LIBRARIAN** shall oversee and direct the Library Committee in maintaining the Guild's Library collection which includes books, magazines, media, and other materials donated or purchased for members' use; bringing a portion of the Library to each general meeting for check-in and check-out at the monthly meetings; purchasing books from allocated funds; and collecting fines for overdue or replacement of lost items. The Librarian shall also update the annual collection of the Library and publish an annual listing for the Guild members via newsletter, email, and/or printed lists at Guild meetings.

The **HISTORIAN/PHOTOGRAPHER** shall take pictures and maintain a scrapbook composed of publicity and mementos of Guild activities and events. The Historian/Photographer reports to the President.

The **PUBLICITY AND PUBLIC RELATIONS COORDINATOR** shall coordinate and distribute material concerning Guild activities and special events and make available at Guild meetings minutes of the previous Guild meeting, the current Newsletter, and other items of general interest. The Publicity/Public Relations Coordinator reports to the President.

The **QUILT SHOW ASSISTANT** shall maintain and update the procedural manual, represent the Quilt Show Committee in the absence of the Quilt Show Chair, and attend all meetings with the Quilt Show Chair.

The **OPPORTUNITY QUILT COMMITTEE CHAIR** shall present the Opportunity Quilt design to the Executive Board for approval, oversee construction through completion of the Opportunity Quilt, arrange for a picture to be taken of the quilt for inclusion on the raffle tickets.

Note: GLORIA BACHMAN is continuing to coordinate and record distribution and sale of Opportunity Quilt tickets and seek outside venues for Opportunity Quilt ticket sales, and coordinate with the Treasurer to be sure the Non-profit raffle report form has been completed each year after the Opportunity Quilt has been awarded to the winner.

2018 Retreat






Quilter of the Month



Let me introduce to you our joy-filled President, ELLEN FRENCH.

Ellen was born in Caro, Michigan, in the thumb of Michigan she says. She was raised there until she went off to Central Michigan University. She received a B.A. in Political Science and ultimately earned an M.A. in Interpersonal Public Communication.



Ellen was not raised in a quilting home, however her mother sewed other things. To her delight, her mother has now become a quilter. Ellen says that her grandmother may have been a quilter as there is a family quilt she could have made.



Ellen is a woman of many talents and areas of creativity. She writes poetry and stories and used to draw portraits. Her early dream was to grow up to be a writer. The best present in her childhood was a big batch of legal pads and pencils from her mother. She was on the debate teams in high school and college which helped her to think critically and formulate arguments. She also was a radio D.J. during this time. She keeps in touch with many of her old friends, including grade school friends.

She has had a number of fascinating jobs including: 7/11 Field Rep after working up from clerk; freelance writer for Gale Research (best job ever); co-owned Calico Cottage Quilt Shop; paralegal, getting her certificate when she was 52; Jr. College teacher; and currently works at Primitive Gatherings. She says most jobs she stayed at about 5 years.

When Ellen was in her 30's, she saw a woman in JoAnns with a cartful of calico. She was so curious that she asked the woman what she planned to do with all that

fabric. When she heard "quilting," Ellen thought, "I could do that!" She taught herself at first with an Alex Anderson book. She made three wall hangings (the only wall hangings she ever made) and 3 lap quilts "all by hand, every bit" as she did not own a sewing machine. She didn't want to purchase one unless it turned out she really did like quilting. Well, it turned out she did like quilting, and in 2001 she purchased a 1947 Featherweight from Aileen Woerth. She felt comfortable with this machine as it looked a lot like the one her mother had and the one she learned to sew on. In fact, she estimates she has now made over 300 quilts, almost all given away!

Show & Tell





Block of the Month

Block of The Month 2017: Block #12

Block is due at the January 2018 meeting.

The block of the month continues our color scheme for the year: black, white, the monthly birthstone color, and a shade (or tint) of that color. This month's color is blue, so your second color should be a tint of blue. Please look at the January newsletter for the color chart. We encourage you to make two blocks, one to enter in the drawing and one to keep. Please sew with an accurate quarter inch.

This block is called Square within a square by Kaye Wood, from the Janome 100 blocks in 50 days. This block is similar to a pineapple block and looks incredible.



Blue tint: One 3 7/8" square (for center); four 1 3/4" X 6" rectangles

Blue: four 1 3/4" X 5 ½" rectangles; two 5 1/2" squares (sub-cut the squares on the diagonal into two rectangles to end with four total)

White fabric: four 1 3/4" X 5" and four 1 3/4" X 7" rectangles


Black fabric: four 1 3/4" X 4 ½" and four 1 3/4" X 6 ½" rectangles

For ease of assembly, fold each piece in half lengthwise and press line in each piece. For the center square press both directions and for the corner triangles, press folding the long side in half.

Assembling the block:

- 1. Arrange rectangles in size order. You will sew from smallest to largest. Starting with the blue tint square sew one of the smallest black rectangles to opposite sides, aligning pressed centers. Press away from the center square.
- 2. Next, look at photo two. Line up the corner of the ruler at a 45 deg. angle as shown so that the outside edges of the ruler touch the seam line (the tip of the ruler will extend past the fabric at the top.) Trim as shown.
- 3. Now sew the remaining two small black rectangles to the other sides. Press away from the center and trim as in step two. See photo 3.
- 4. Sew on the next row using the center of the prior square to line up the center of the rectangle being attached. Always press away from the center Using photos 4 & 5 as reference, when trimming, use a square ruler, make sure the 1 ½ inch line on both edges of the ruler is on the previous seam line of the prior two rows.


5. Keep adding rows in size order and when



Press and using a 12-½" square up ruler, trim to get a 12 ½" block. Repeat to make a second block!






