It is not your business to determine how good it is ... It is your business to keep it yours clearly and directly, to keep the channel open."

# 2019 Valley of the Mist Quilter's Guild Programs

Linda Schmidt January 8, 2019 January 9, 2019

Lecture: Short Attention Span Trunk Show Wednesday Workshop: Miniature Landscape 101

This is a grand quilt and garment show, where Linda will bring about 30 quilts and a few ensembles with an emphasis on artistic techniques, artistry and poetry. Techniques demonstrated in the hands-on workshop include fabric painting, leaf painting, various methods of machine and hand appliqué, machine embroidery, thread painting, use of Solvy and disappearing medium as well as free motion quilting.



February 12, 2019 Lecture: The Art of Silk Fusion

February 13-14, 2019 Midweek Workshop: Silk Fusion and Mosaics

Tamara, from Golden, Colorado, will provide a two-day workshop combining fibers with textile medium producing rich in luxurious shine and color. In this class, the students will create two silk fusion pieces which will then be used to create a mosaic on the second day. The \$60 workshop fee includes: silk tussah fibers, silk hankies, fabric medium, silk threads, Angelina fibers, gold leafing for embellishment, fiberglass screening, brushes and the plastic drop cloths for the fusion process.



March 12, 2019 Lecture: Enjoying the Journey
March 16, 2019 Saturday Workshop: Millennium Star

Peggy will teach a quick-strip paper piecing method using assembly-line piecing on fabric strips. Beginners find this method less confusing and easy to learn, while experienced quilters are delighted by this quicker, simplified technique. See her website for photos, and detailed descriptions and supply lists.

April 9, 2019 Lecture: Storm at Sea - From Traditional to Contemporary April 13-14, 2019 Weekend Workshop: Storm at Sea

In another two-day workshop, Wendy will offer three pattern variations to make using the traditional "Storm at Sea" block, vastly simplified by learning a method of trimming as you sew, using squares and rectangles cut from strips. All patterns are supplied. Students are not required to purchase tools, books or kits.

May 14, 2019 Lecture: Art Quilts for the Non-Artist
May 18, 2019 Saturday workshop: Spectrum 18" Square

Elizabeth is in the process of adding new lectures and workshops from which we can choose at a later date. This handwork class, done with English Paper Piecing (EPP), is shown with Kaffe Fassett fabrics with a wide range of surface color for a lot of fussy cutting to get the rainbow.

October 8, 2019 Lecture: A Desperate Housewife's Quilt Journey
October 12, 2019 Saturday Workshop: Curved Paper Pieced Flying Geese

Students immediately move beyond the basic paper pieced geese, by adding a dramatic twist, to design a small quilt (18" x 24") with **curved** flying geese. In this class, you will learn to design, draw, measure and sew the pattern. Sue will discuss, in detail, the many options available for using curved flying geese in borders or as central design elements — opening up new horizons to curved paper foundation piecing.













## **Block of the Month**

#### Block of The Month 2019: Block #1

Welcome to our 2019 block of the month. Here is our first improvisational block for the year with our new focus fabric, Modern Movement by Henry Glass. The blocks are due at the February 2019 meeting.

The fabrics you need this month are our new focus fabric (we will have fat quarters for \$2 at the meeting), your coordinating fabric based on the colors in the focus fabric, a grey fabric and a white fabric.

We encourage you to make two blocks, one to enter in the drawing and one to keep. Also, the Guild's Facebook page should have a post directing you to the YouTube instructions for this block.



Focus fabric: one 1" X 13.5" rectangle


Grey, white, and

coordinating-color fabric: cut a total of seven strips from these three fabrics, 13.5" long, with widths varying from 2" to 3.5". The total width of these seven strips need to equal at least 16 inches but no more than 17.25".

Including the focus fabric, you should have eight, 13.5" strips.

#### Assembling the block:

- Arrange the strips in an order that pleases you. Try to have one of your wider strips in the middle – not the focus fabric strip. After they are sewn together, we will be cutting down the middle, so we need the middle to be wide enough to cut and have at least ½ inch of fabric on either side of the cut.
- Sew the strips together using a ¼" seam. Try to keep the ends even.
- Now cut the block in four by cutting down the middle of each side. If any of the edges are ragged, trim to even up the side, but trim as little as possible. The four cut pieces should be about 6 <sup>3</sup>/<sub>4</sub>" square.



- Now lay out these squares as a 4-patch and rotate these squares until you find an arrangement that you like.
- Sew together each row and press the center seams in opposite directions.
- Sew these two rows together.
- Press seams and square the block to 12½ X 12½". Repeat to make a second block to keep!

## **Ways And Means**



#### START CLEANING YOUR SEWING ROOM!

I know it has just turned into winter and all, but now that the holidays are over, it's definitely time to at least start taking stock of what-all is lurking in your sewing room. I believe my own sewing room is probably in worse shape than most, so I'll be getting at this task myself, don't think I won't.

The process of cleaning one's sewing room isn't really Spring Cleaning, which is why I'm advocating a prompt start. It's one of those **New Year's Resolution things**, which is why I'm going to be shameless about reminding you about this every single month here in the newsletter. Yes, it's time to get real—really real—about what's in there, and whether you're actually ever going to do anything with it other than move it to another corner. I believe the rule of thumb for sorting all sorts of amassed (sorry—collected) goods is **if you haven't done anything with it in three years, you're not likely to this year either**. But I do realize it's hard to part with some particularly lovely fabrics, or kits, or whatever. What I finally decided was that I should turn it over to the guild, and either let someone put the dang project together for philanthropy, or sell it.

So I urge you to get to work in your sewing room, setting aside a bin just for guild. Believe me, the guild can find a use for whatever it is: philanthropy, or the Merchandise table, or the June Basket Bonanza. And P.S.: we can also use any old baskets or other fun containers you don't need. And you know you have them. It's a kind of genetic thing with quilters, to buy various baskets and little trunks and little lunch boxes and other containers. If you decide you don't need some of these things, we'll take them! Also, if you maybe got two dozen little tubes of hand cream for Christmas and you're allergic to them (I'm not making a veiled reference to the one dozen tunes I got at the Christmas party, Adriane—I'm using them!), we'd be happy to give them a new home.

So get cracking! And bring your stuff to guild, deliver it to me, Ellen French, and then give yourself a pat on the back. Because once you've made some inroads organizationally in your sewing room, it's a state law that you are now allowed to go buy new stuff with a clear conscience.

Stuff we can use: Fabric, kits (even partially completed), orphan blocks, precuts, books, patterns, quilting magazines, and notions. We are happy to accept larger items as well, as we can put them in the silent auction portion of the Bonanza.

# **Philanthropy**



#### 2018 Philanthropy Report

Valley of the Mist Quilter's Guild has a long tradition of Philanthropy. During 2018, our generous members have given of their time, effort, financial resources, skill, talent and prayers to hundreds of individuals throughout our valley and surrounding area. It is hard to estimate, but over 6,000 volunteer hours have culminated in an unprecedented year of community support.

Our Guild donated hundreds of hand-made items including: 70 twin bed sized bed quilts, 58 quilts including twin sized quilts, lap quilts, and throws for women and children, 53 baby items (including burp pads, changing pads, comfort pads and crib quilts), 58 Christmas stockings, over 250 pillow cases, over 100 dog beds and many knit scarves and hats. The recipients of these items are:

US Vets Program at March ARB Alternatives to Domestic Violence Assistance League - Forster Youth Program SAFE PALS program for at risk youth Local animal rescue shelters

In addition, monthly items were collected to the Alternatives to Domestic Violence. We donated: twin bed sheets, pillows, cleaning supplies, gas and food gift cards, washcloths and towels, office supplies art and crafts supplies, fabric, and sewing machines with sewing supplies.




