President's Message



Summer is almost over (kind of), and not a second too soon! Hopefully you have all had a nice summer, made a few quilts, maybe traveled a little.

The 2018 Quilt show is right around the corner! I'm hoping that more of you will want to show your quilts. Let me lay your concerns to rest for we have NEVER had a quilt go missing. Further, there are many places in town to hang quilts that are out of the reach of the general public. As you read the display form, you can request a location for that. Further still, we have a herd of volunteer Kiwanis members that are specifically on the lookout for that sort of thing, as are our own members. It's also always a good idea to put a small sign on each of your quilts (as I will be doing) that says, "PLEASE DO NOT TOUCH!" Hanging a sheet behind your quilt is another good idea to help it stay clean. If you yourself cannot handle the sun, rest assured there are places to hang your quilts where other guild members can do the guarding.

A team from the quilt show committee queued the quilts last weekend. This is a procedure in which the quilts for auction are numbered, photographed, and recorded into a database prior to the auction. There are some real beauties to sell, as there seem to be every year. I am confident it is going to be a great show. **Kudos to Rita Dominguez, her assistant Janice Quackenbush, and all the rest of her committee!**

Shirley Brown and her Nominating Committee have been doing a great job of recruiting folks to fill slots so the business of the guild can go on in 2019. Please find her article here in this newsletter and read it to see if there are any jobs you or you and a friend could possibly fill. Merchandise may still be open, and I know for sure we are still looking for a First VP, someone to handle PR/Publicity, and someone (or, ideally, a team) to make the 2020 Opportunity Quilt.

If you haven't yet submitted your budget request for 2019, you'd better get that in. There is no guarantee you will receive the budget you request, but we will be setting the budget for next year very soon, so we need that information. A few words on the budget. Many members listen to the Treasurer's Report and think, "wow, with that kind of money in the bank, why can't my program have the money we need? Why can't we spend it?" This is kind of difficult to explain, but if you've been self-employed, you'll get it. Pretend you ARE self-employed. Your income is solely reliant on what income you can generate from whatever it is that you do. Because you cannot predict the future, you do not know for sure how much money you will make each week, each month, over the course of the year. However, you DO know how much you absolutely need to SPEND each year for the bare essentials: housing, food, utilities, etc. It makes good sense to not splurge, and to keep your expenses as low as you can in order that you will be sure to be able to cover those expanses. Because again, we don't really know what the income will be. Additionally, emergencies can arise, like a flood in which you lose furniture, maybe have to evacuate and stay in a hotel, etc.

This same scenario applies to the guild. We HOPE we will generate enough income to cover our expenses. We not only have various programs that want or need to spend money during the year, but we also have to pay rent at the CRC every month. We have to pay for our storage unit every month. We have to pay for insurance, and to rent the PO box to get our mail. We have to pay for various hospitality items each meeting, like the drinks, paper plates, utensils, etc. Unexpected crises are not unheard of. One year the CRC abruptly decided to omit us from their calendar. We had to find another place to meet and guess what? It cost us a lot more each month to meet there. We had to meet there for two or three years, and we had not planned for that. It definitely ate into what we had in the bank.

President's Message, con't.

Every time the guild decides to spend money on things, it removes some of the cushion. We always expect to spend—annually—about the same amount that we usually have in the bank. So we HAVE to generate about that much every year. This is why it's so important that our fundraising efforts meet or exceed our expectations, and that we trim the budget as much as we can, where we can.

Be sure to read your newsletter completely each month. It usually has all the information you need, and very often answers most questions you may have.

Please join us for the quilt show. We need your volunteer help! The quilt show is the one thing that makes us most visible in the community, so let's make ourselves proud!

Thank you for being a part of Valley of the Mist.

It's almost here!! I want to thank those of you who entered a quilt to be auctioned. This quilt show auction is the biggest fund raiser of the year! This money helps us support our guild so we can enjoy our guest speakers and their workshops. Our Quilt show also enables us to donate to nonprofit charities. Those of you who are displaying quilts will make the town sparkle with color and one of a kind quilts. Visitors and quilt buyers enjoy our outdoor show and auction and make plans to return the next year.

Please remember to "like" us on our Facebook page and share posts with all of your social media contacts. The success of our live-streaming and online bidding depends on our members sharing information.

October 5th from 5pm-7pm, we will be hanging rope. **We will be meeting at the corner of Old Town Front Street and 6th Street in front of Garden Cottage.**

On Saturday, October 6th, you need to have your display **quilts hung by 10am**. The earlier the better so others can help you. We will have someone to help you take your quilt down. Philanthropy Quilts are hung on the Rancon Building and Ida will need a lot of help. Please cruise around town to see who needs help. Men are needed to help hang 60 quilts for auction in the theater courtyard by 8am. This is a BIG task. Please do not hang quilts in doorways or walkways leading up to doors even if there are ropes in these spots. It's easier to stretch rope than cut. We do need the ropes removed and returned. We do not want to buy more rope, we are on a budget.

If you have concerns about your quilts getting dirty, you may want to hang a sheet behind your quilt as the buildings are a little dirty.

Please wear blue pants, shorts or a blue skirt with a white top and apron so visitors can easily identify us. Janice Quackenbush has purchased black aprons with our logo to wear if you like. Come to the theater for your apron and return the apron at the theater, as well. We will use them again for future events. We will be emailing you your volunteering assignment and where you will be displaying your quilt(s). **The show ends at 4pm. We must remove quilts, ropes and signs by 5pm. Shout out if you need help.**

We will have Kiwanis club members with students earning community service credit to help hang rope and quilts as well as take them down.

MOST IMPORTANT: Please! NO individual sales of quilts at our show. It creates liability issues with the Guild and diminishes the returns from our auction.

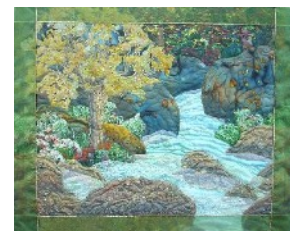

Midweek Workshop: Silk Fusion and Mosaics

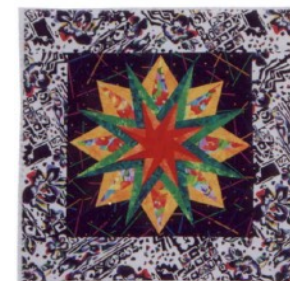

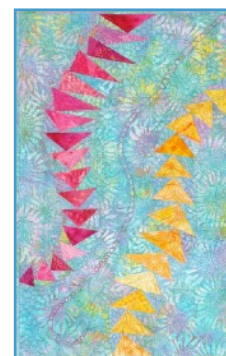

Students immediately move beyond the basic paper pieced geese, by adding a dramatic twist, to design a small quilt (18" x 24") with **curved** flying geese. In this class, you will learn to design, draw, measure and sew the pattern. Sue will discuss, in detail, the Manu options available for using curved flying geese in borders or as central design elements — opening up new horizons to **curved** paper foundation piecing.



Block of the Month

Block of The Month 2018: Block #10

We are doing a block this month that is a lot like one we did last year. This one is called Rocky Road to California, which is only slightly different from the block called Water Wheel. The color placement is what changes the look. The blocks are due at the November meeting.


The fabrics you need this month are the focus fabric -- Effervescence – Wild by Robert Kaufman, your coordinating fabric based on the colors in the focus fabric, a black fabric and a white fabric. We are still selling fat quarters of the focus fabric at the meetings for \$2 each but we only have two left.

We encourage you to make two blocks, one to enter in the drawing and one to keep.

Cut list -- For one block:

Focus fabric: two 2½" squares
 Coordinating-color fabric: six 2½" squares
 two 4½" squares
 two 5" squares
 Black: four 2½" squares
 White: two 5" squares

Assembling the block:

- Use the photos for color placement and assembly help.
 - To make the half square triangle sections, draw a diagonal line on the back of white 5" squares. Place each of these squares right sides together with a 5" square of your coordinating color fabric. Sew $\frac{1}{4}$ " from each side of the drawn line. Cut on the drawn line. Press to the color. Use a ruler to square up these sections to $4\frac{1}{2}$ " squares. You should have four units.
 - Next, make the three four-patch units. For the center, use the two focus fabric squares and two $2\frac{1}{2}$ " squares of your coordinating fabric. For the other two, use your remaining $2\frac{1}{2}$ " squares – black and coordinating color fabric. Press to the darker fabric.
- 

Now the final assembly! Layout pieces in correct order as shown in photo one.

- Using a precise 1/4" seam allowance and right sides together, sew the horizontal rows together, alternate the pressing of the middle row with the top and bottom rows so the seams will nest in the next step.
- Keep rows in order and now sew rows together. The seams should nest and help keep patches aligned.
- Press seams and square the block to 12½" x 12½". Repeat to make a second block to keep!

The winners of the blocks at the September meeting were: May blocks – Gloria Bachmann, June blocks –Carole Donahoe, July blocks –Jeannette Stevens, and August blocks – Maria Lucas. Congratulations!

They indicated that these are the best type for a shelter, because with so many people helping, they often pick up items like legos or other items that may jam the machines. They have had more expensive vacuums, but they cost more to repair than to replace with the cheaper versions.

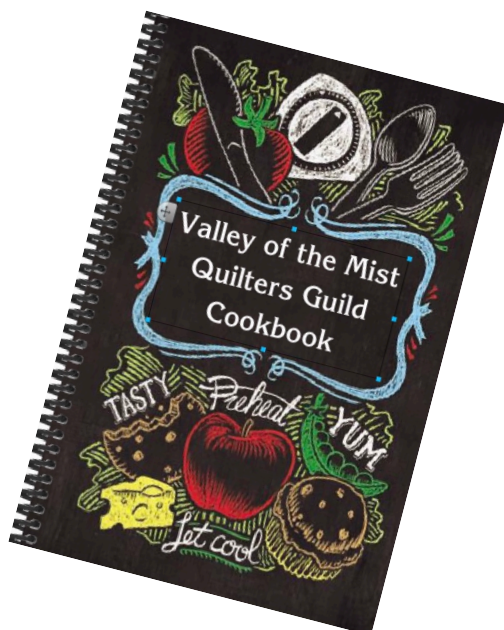

Workshop Instructions

Introduction to Machine Quilting An Adventure in Free Motion Machine Quilting

Beginning Level

Instructor: Jill Schumacher

Objective of this Class: In this class, you will learn to quilt loops, curves, designs, free motion straight lines and simple stipple by using your home sewing machine. You will also learn how to follow a design, both continuous and beautiful heirloom feathers. You will learn the art of Heirloom free-motion machine quilting. Today's quilts are tomorrow's heirlooms. Each student will learn to follow simple designs and will quilt a feathered wreath plus learn how to ditch stitch your quilts using the free motion method.

Supply List: Things you will need for class.

- 6 each 14" muslin squares with backing and batting to fit. Batting and backing squares may be cut 14" square also. **Please cut and mark prior to class.**
- Sewing Machine in good working order with **instruction manual**. For ideal machine quilting you should be able to drop or cover your feed dogs.
- Free motion quilting foot or darning foot for machine. If unsure, bring all of your feet for machine. I do carry a wide variety of free motion feet for many makes and models of machines and will have them available for purchase if necessary. (Do not use embroidery foot. This does not work.) **No walking foot.**
- Plexiglas surround for your machine. (Can be purchased at your local quilt shop or on-line) or a small surround that comes with some machines is fine. **(This is optional but is desirable)**
- Scissors (small). A small pair of embroidery scissors works well.
- 1 pkg. Schmetz Microtex Sharp #70 machine needles
- Safety pins (just a handful)
- Blue water soluble marking pen or white pencil for marking your designs. (Must be water soluble). **Do not use purple air erase marker. I carry markers for sale if you need them.**
- Clear nylon monofilament thread for ditch work. I recommend either Superior brand or YLI.
- Threads for stitching: Recommended threads are Aurifil 50 weight cotton, Mettler 50 weight cotton, DMC thread, YLI Machine Quilting Thread. Note: You will need two different colors so that top and bottom threads are different. **No variegated thread or Polyester thread PLEASE.**
- 1 each completed Ohio Star Block with a piece of backing and batting to fit the block. Make the Ohio Star block out of fabrics of your choice, something you'd like in your home. Backing fabric of your choice. Separate Directions Included.
- Recommended Batting: Quilters Dream Wool, Warm and Natural, Warm and White, Hobbs 80/20 blend. Quilter's Dream Cotton. **No puffy Poly Batting PLEASE.**

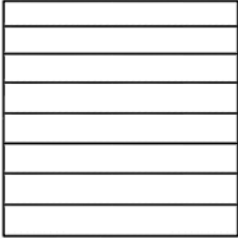

Instructions for Pre-marking your squares:

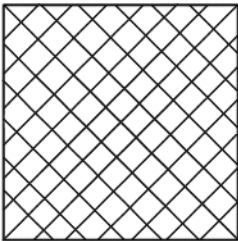
Use either a blue water-soluble pen or a white marking pencil. Make sure you can see your lines and lines can be removed with water after you have finished quilting.

- Mark (2) squares with horizontal lines, one inch apart on the entire square.



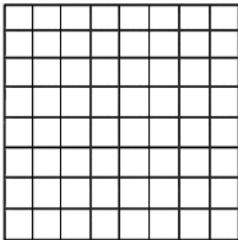
Lines should be approximately 1 inch apart

- Mark (1) square with diagonal lines in both directions one inch apart.



Lines should be approximately 1 inch apart

- Mark (1) square with vertical and horizontal lines one inch apart.



Lines should be approximately 1 inch apart

- Leave the 2 remaining squares blank until class.

Opportunity Quilt

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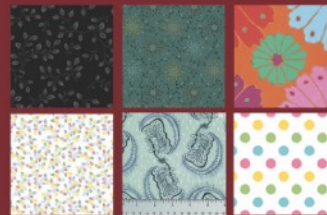
