



Baste & Banter

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After dabbling in a myriad of needlecrafts from knitting, needlepoint, cross stitch, and macramé, **Wendy Mathson** discovered her passion for quilting after finishing her first baby quilt in 1982. She was instrumental in organizing the **Prayers for Squares** ministry which, as of March 2013, there were over 11,000 chapters in 11 countries!

Her quilting career grew out of her graphic design business based in San Diego, and while collecting mounds of scraps donated for prayer quilts, she developed a series of guild lectures based on "scrap management." Utilizing scraps spurred her on create pattern designs using the improved piecing techniques she developed.



Wendy is best known for her unique approach to making the "Storm at Sea" quilt with her uniquely designed "cut-after-you-sew" tools she calls Quilters' TRIMplates. Her specialty is teaching a fast, easy, and accurate method for making the traditional "Storm at Sea" pattern without using templates or paper piecing.

Wendy is a quilting book designer, illustrator, author, and editor, as well teacher and lecturer. She began teaching adult education classes at Palomar College, and has since taught Empty Spools Seminars at Asilomar since 2012, and she will return there again this year! She's also taught on cruises to Alaska, through the Panama Canal, and the Caribbean.

Her two-day workshop will provide additional time to explore design variations and incorporate the Storm at Sea design in borders. Students can choose one of three designs, and the skill levels range from confident beginner to advanced. All patterns are supplied – and students are not required to purchase the TRIMplate tools, books or kits. They will be provided for your use in the workshop. If you're interested in purchasing the trim plates or signed books prior to the class, however, you may email her at wmathson@cox.net.

WORKSHOP INSTRUCTIONS:

The next workshop is on Saturday, April 13 and Sunday, April 14, 2019 from 10:00 am to 4:00 pm at Glen Oaks Hills Community Club House, 40101 De Portola, Temecula, Ca 92592, with Wendy Mathson as our instructor. She will lecture Storm at Sea – From Traditional Contemporary on Tuesday, April 9th during our guild meeting. The goal of this workshop is for you to learn a unique piecing method by making one of the Storm at Sea variations pictures. This technique does not use templates of paper foundation piecing. Instead, you use oversize pieces that are trimmed after sewing, using the TRIMplate rulers. She will provide TRIMplates for each student to use in class. 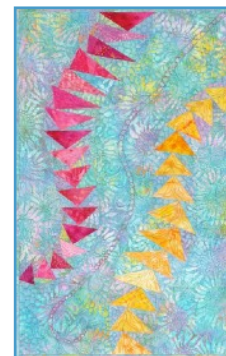
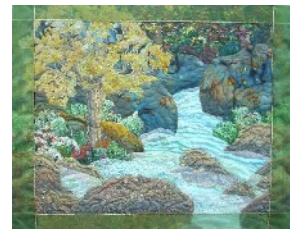
Lecture: Art Quilts for the Non-Artist

Block of the Month

Block of The Month 2019: Block #4

Hello everyone! It's a new month and a wonderful new block. We hope you like the block last month – this one is easier. Remember we are using our new focus fabric, Modern Movement by Henry Glass (available at the guild meetings for \$2 per fat quarter.) You only need to use this fabric if you are turning in a block for the drawing. The blocks are due at the May 2019 meeting.

The fabrics you need this month are the focus fabric, your coordinating fabric based on the colors in the focus fabric, a gray fabric and a white fabric.

We encourage you to make two blocks, one to enter in the drawing at the guild meeting and one to keep. Also, the Guild's Facebook page should have a post directing you to the YouTube instructions for this block.

Cut list -- For one block:

Focus fabric: one 2" X 7" rectangle

Gray fabric: two 2½" X 7" rectangles

Coordinating-color fabric: three 2½" X 7" rectangles

White fabric: one 13½" X 9½" rectangle
two 1½" X 7"

Please note that the seven-inch strips are not the same width.

Assembling the block:

- Gather all the 7" strips of fabric and arrange them in an order that pleases you. Try not to put the focus fabric in the middle, but that isn't critical. See photo 2.
- Sew these pieces together along the 7" sides. The finished piece should be approximately 14" long.
- Take the finished piece and even up the edges, don't trim off more than a quarter inch. Now cut a strip 2¼" from one of the long sides. Fold the remaining piece in half and finger press to mark the half. Use this mark to cut it into two. See photo 3 -- take the middle piece and turn it 180°.
- Set these aside – but keep in order. Take the remaining white rectangle and cut it approximately in half the long way. Don't be too particular. Now with each of these halves, make another cut from top to bottom but slightly angle your ruler. Try to make sure that the ends of each piece are at least one inch wide. See photo 4.
- Keep these pieces in order but spread them apart. Take the pieces from the first step and place one between each of the white strips. See photo 5.
- Be careful to keep these in order and in the correct orientation. It helps to mark the tops with a pin or clip to make sure they don't get turned. Sew these strips together. The pieced strips are slightly longer, so center the white strips on these pieces. Press to the white fabric.
- Lay the block right side up and put your 12.5" square-up ruler on the block. Move the ruler around until you find the most pleasing look for your block and square the block to 12½" X 12½". Repeat to make a second block to keep! The winner of the blocks at the March meeting was Chris Day. Congratulations!

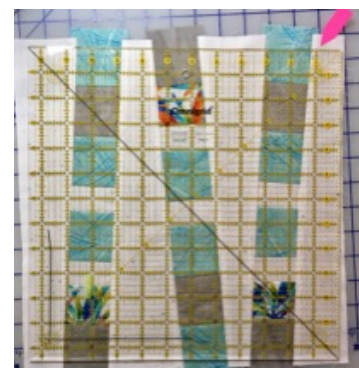

Basket Bonanza

IT'S TIME FOR THE 2019 BASKET BONANZA!!

THANKS SO MUCH for your spring cleaning efforts! As you may know, our June meeting is entirely devoted to what we call the **Basket Bonanza**. This whole deal is a ton of exciting fun. Members sort through their sewing rooms and stashes, determine that they have fabric or kits or books or patterns and other stuff that they will never use up in their lifetimes, and wisely decide to give over to the guild. The guild uses these donations for our Basket Bonanza.

We organize these items into various baskets and containers (which mostly, the baskets, anyway, you have to return to us so we can do this all again next year), and you and 100 of your closest quilting and sewing and crafting friends show up and buy many tickets for. You then write your name on every ticket. **If you're thinking ahead, you bring a boatload of return address labels you've received in the mail from various charities and save yourself a lot of time.** Then you stroll around the room and put your tickets into the brown paper bags, one in front of each basket-o-goods. After a reasonable amount of time, we draw a winning ticket from each bag and you trundle home with your winnings! You can increase your stash just like **that** (finger snap here). I have personally won a sewing machine at this event! We usually have over 100 baskets of stuff, which include fabric, craft items, notions and tools, books, patterns.

In addition to the general baskets, several friendship groups usually assemble a basket full of things. This year it is rumored that one of these friendship baskets will be a Longaberger basket. Those are no longer being made and sold, so it's a pretty unique item. (It even has its hard plastic liner.) There will also be a "Silent Auction" area, which has in the past included an antique wooden ironing board and a floor-stand OTT Lite. This year the Silent Auction will include a wooden sewing room shelf, a sewing machine, and a portable pressing table.

Since this Bonanza takes place in June, that means we have only this month and next in which to receive your donations! So if you have not started cleaning your sewing room, DO! We need your castoffs!

And remember, **there are no guest fees for the Basket Bonanza, so be sure to invite all your friends! Tell them to bring their address labels, and cash, check or credit card, we take them all!!**

Fabric Exchange

Hello Fabric Exchangers!

For the APRIL exchange, there are 17 participants in the upcoming exchange of **POLKA DOTS (any color)**.

Please prepare **your 17 sets of 3 fabrics, cut in 2.5" by WOF 42-45"** strips. There is no need to bag or pin the sets together. Simply **fold the sets of 3 - one of each fabric - in half & then half again together** and stack them in a large (gallon) plastic bag with **YOUR NAME on it that will be returned to you at the end of the meeting**.

*****PLEASE, PLEASE, please** be sure to sort your strips into sets of 3 different fabrics that are folded together as described. There is simply not enough time at the meeting for me to do this for you. Thank you so much !!! *****

For newcomers, you sign up at the General Meeting for the months you choose based on the theme for that meeting. Examples- the exchange for the February meeting was Pinks & Reds. After you are notified by e-mail and/or phone of the number of participants for the upcoming meeting, you will prepare **(3) different fabric STRIPS** that are **2 1/2" by WOF** for each participant which includes yourself. For example, if there are 10 participants, you will bring (10) sets of 2.5 " strips sorted into **sets of the 3 different fabrics** in a plastic bag with your name on it. At the end of the meeting, you will go home with 30 strips of 2.5 in. various fabric strips (which includes the 3 fabrics you brought) to create with as you choose.

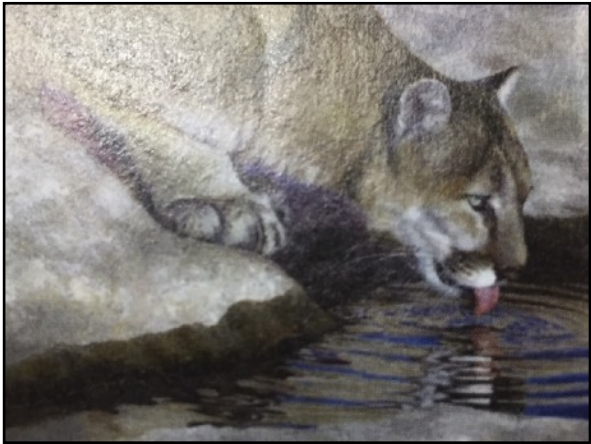

2019 Challenge Quilt



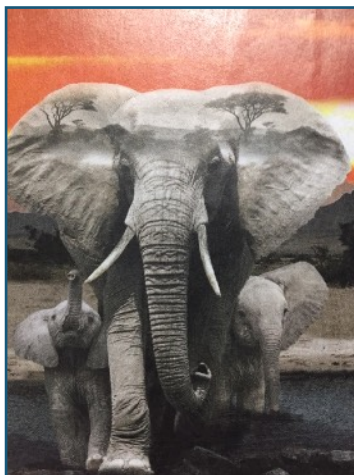
2019 Valley of the Mist Quilt Guild CHALLENGE: "Quilter's Going Wild, appreciating Nature's Wildlife"

Judging Categories:

1. Originality and creativity of design
2. Best use of color
3. Excellence in workmanship

Judging shall be based on the following:

1. The quilt's focus is one or more wildlife creatures.
2. Each member may enter one (1) quilt in the Challenge - show us your best!
3. The quilt is current, completed after September 2018.
4. Size of quilt has no minimum, but maximum size is a 240" perimeter (so all quilts can be displayed during judging and at the Old Town Quilt Show).
5. The quilt is made of our fave medium - fabrics, either by hand or machine, sandwiched with batting, and quilted by hand, domestic or long-arm machine.
6. The quilt is labeled with quilter's name and date. The label shall be covered at judging time, using blue painter's tape preferred.
7. Quilter shall sign up to enter the Challenge, with the Challenge Coordinator Carole Donahoe at any Guild Meeting from February until August 2019, or by email to caroledonahoe@icloud.com.
8. Quilter shall have fun and enjoy challenging fellow quilters!

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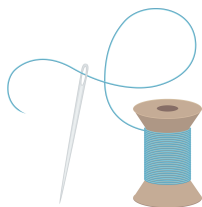
